NOTE 1 – I do not know who was responsible for the criteria for registration – just Forestry Commission or was their consultation with others?

NOTE 2 – Forest District Managers had to quickly produce entries for the register in their area, there were inconsistences in interpretation and in the following year I got the job of sorting it out.

1990

*NOTE* – late 1990 Graham Tuley became Highland Woodland Adviser in Inverness.

### 1993

Note – during the winter shoots were collected from all pine trees in Glen Loyne, Glen Falloch and many in Glen Einig. My intention was that Coir a' Ghamhna pinewood would be the third one not Glen Einig but it was decided that a Forestry Commission pinewood had to be included and Coir a' Ghamhna would have been much more difficult to deal with.

This was using a standard forestry technique of grafting shoots of old trees onto seedlings to create a shed orchard – in this case all trees can be brought together to interbreed [see paper in 1995].
